From The Editor Visit To ARRL Headquarters - W1AW

On a last minute whim, Terry, K2EYS and I made a two day trip to the Newington, CT area. The first day we visited a "Lock Museum" and a "Clock and Watch Museum". Both of these were great. On our second day we visited the ARRL headquarters. We took a tour of the facilities and ended our tour with operating from the W1AW station. I think I called out CQ only once and it was all she wrote from there. I have never worked as the center of a pile-up before and it was a bit intimidating. The station is only available for operation certain hours of the day. We had the first time slot of 10AM to 12PM. By the time we were set up and given instructions on the station I think we operated a little less than a hour. I was on 15 meters and made 27 contacts, while Terry was on 17 meters and made 26 contacts. Terry and I both came away from that experience with a profound appreciation of what the operators on a DX pedition go through. The one thing that sticks in my mind is that all the code practice sessions are generated on a OLD Compaq computer running windows 98. They said, "If it ain't broke....". They ARE looking for someone to volunteer time to redesign the code program to run on windows 7 and eventually windows 10.

I would highly recommend every ham to take the opportunity to make a trip like this. Really you could spend a lot more time there than we did. There is SO000 much history and things to do in the area.


NEW BUSINESS:

St Lucia - An Adventure Continues, Part I

Last Springtime, I worked some Germans operating from J6, St Lucia. Having visited the island a few times as a tourist and as a Ham, I looked them up on QRZ.COM. The QTH the operated from was called the Bay Guesthouse, in Gros Islet, a small fishing village near the capital of Castries. I went to the web site for the property and found it interesting and very ham friendly. Mostly, it was cheap, a prime requirement for hams! I contacted my old travelling buddy, K1ZZI and he jumped on the bandwagon.

I decided on 12 days - the most clean clothes I wanted to carry! Melissa nodded and went along with the plans. K1ZZI and his girlfriend rented a studio apartment below us and we had a two bedroom suite, with all the comforts required by hams- air conditioned bedrooms, complete kitchen with a freezer and fridge, bathroom and a large, comfortable livingroom. Our accommodations opened to a huge covered veranda, complete with two tables and plenty of chairs, and electrical outlet.

J69 DS, Frans, obtained licenses for us with no problems. We just had to fill out the forms and email them to him. Customs clearance was the same for my radio, antennas and computers. When Melissa and I arrived after out 4 1/2 hour flight from JFK, the St Lucian authorities sent us to the immigration / customs officer handling CARICOM nationals, apparently we were recognized as frequent visitors. The officer asked what was in the long bag. I responded 'i just some aluminum tubes and antenna supplies, it is for ham radio'. She smiled and said OK and off we went.

Hauling our bags around the corner and outside, Melissa immediately saw our good friends, the Laurencin family. My pal, 'Jungle', operates a water taxi and took time off to stop and have a cold drink and visit with us. Of course, his wife, Majella was with him and the two children (who got the afternoon off school). After a cold local beer, PITON, I spotted Ralph, K1ZZI and his YL rounding the corner with bags in tow. They had spotted our ride to the North and introduced us to Polly, the driver.

You need to envision an island, 26 miles long and 15 miles at its widest, with mountains in the middle. The airport is in the south, at Vieux Fort (as is the medical school and brewery). We were staying on the northeast coast, not far as the crow flies. ONE and One Half Hours later we arrived at the Bay Guesthouse. Imagine ribbon candy in a box.. the roads twisted and turned so we met ourselves coming and going.. up steep inclines with a sheer drop on one side and a cliff rising on the other. There were pot holes large enough to swallow a Cooper mini! we only had to travel a little over 30 Km but we never could go faster than km/hr. None of us complained one bit about Polly's driving. Besides they drive on the left, thanks to the British. In the island's history, it changed hands 14 times between the French and British outstanding pastries, lousy driving.

We arrived in one piece and J69DS was there to immediately set up antennas at the water's edge. A 17 meter vertical went up along with the Buddipole 20m.dipole- more on them later. Frans drove a steel post in the ground and secured a 10meter fiberglass pole to it. This held the 40 meter vertical, just wire and some electrical tape. Connected to an SO-239 at the base with three radials. two of which were floating on the salt water most of the time. This was a 'killer antenna', it loaded on 80-10 meters with the Elecraft K3. If there was propagation, we made QSOs on this antennas reliably.

Hunger overtook us as the last meal was back in the USA and it was nightfall. Our hosts, Will and Stephanie, had prepared a welcome guide and the Night watchman, jack of all trades, DYSON, had a recommendation for supper. Out the front gate, a three minute walk and we were at "Flavors of the Grill". In the meantime, J69MV, TOT, a retired Inspector of Police, called me on 2 FM. With my sketchy directions he managed to find us as we went in for dinner. It was at an open air restaurant/bar. No, chicken wings and pizza were not on the menus but fresh, grilled fish, chicken and good old cheeseburgers were there. The five of us dined on selection that could not be easily had in Western NY. Everything was tasty, so much so, that we went back several times during our stay. I have several receipts from our dinners and was surprised about cost - pleasantly surprised!

This ended our first evening on J6. Two ham friends were there to meet us and be certain we were off to a good start on our adventure. We left the restaurant and walked back to our villa. We were all pretty well whipped but somehow K1ZZI and I managed to unpack the gear and set up the station . Let the fun
